Global Campus Fall Virtual Graduation 2021

DAVE CILLAY:

Good morning. It is amazing being with you today. I am honored to be one of the first to say congratulations on your graduation. Today is special. Special for you for sure. But it is also special for all of us. This is the very first graduation ceremony that Global Campus has conducted as a commencement. It is the first time of doing this, and hopefully it will be wonderful.

I got to say when Nolan, our president, came to Debbie O'Donnell and I. Debbie is our Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, and said you know the student government would like to host their own graduation ceremony. We said that sounds exciting, that sounds great, what time next year should we do that? And Nolan said No, no. We'd like to do it this semester. Once Debbie and I picked our chins up off the floor, we said all right we will look and see if we can make this happen. Here we are today.

So, I have to say not only thank you to our student government, but also how much we appreciate their leadership and things that they have done to improve Global Campus. Not just with this ceremony, but all the things that happen throughout the year. So, thank you I am honored. That means we have been doing online distance education for almost three decades.

I think back to when we first started doing this. The process for the student was they would get a study pack, lectures on VHS cassette tapes (I don't know if many of you remember what those were) and their textbook. And they would work through assignments, complete the assignment by writing it out on a piece of paper, they would put it in a pre-stamped envelope, they would mail it back to the Distance Degree Program (DDP), someone at DDP would open it up, put it in another pre-stamped envelope and mail it off to the faculty member. The faculty member would then grade it, review it, put notes on it, put it in an envelope, mail it back to DDP. DDP would open it up, put it in another envelope and mail it back to the student. The student would react to it, and if there were corrections that had to be made, they would put it another envelope and that whole process would begin again. And I think about where we started and where we're at now. The type of community we've been able to build, the interactions that students have, not just with faculty but with one another, with their advisors, with the folks in the Global Campus. I am amazed at the progress and the transition that we have made over the course of 30 years.

I have to think, looking forward the future is really exciting. If we look forward another 30 years, think of the type of environment we are going to be able to create. Even though you are graduating here today, our graduates, I hope you stay connected. I hope you keep pushing the Global Campus and Washington State University to mature and evolve to something more, something better. So, enough about Global Campus. Enough about things other than you.

Although it is our time to celebrate your accomplishment, I do want to take one moment and acknowledge the folks that got you here today. So, this is a call-to-action on our graduates right now. What I'd like you to do is write out the names of the individuals who have acknowledged you, supported you, encouraged you, loved you to move forward in your graduation. As those names are coming forward, I would like to acknowledge the fact, and this is something I believe in, often times an individual's life is defined by moments in time, by soundbites. I will throw one out for you. College graduate. You are a college graduate. You have done what very few people ever start and even fewer accomplish. You are a college graduate. More importantly, and again this is my bias, you are a graduate of Washington State University. You are now and forever a Coug.

You are part of an intense, passionate, worldwide family of Cougs. Congratulations and Go Cougs! I would now like to introduce our president, Kirk Schulz.
